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What is a report?

- Report is NOT
 - Re-collection of papers and ported into a single paper = COPY
- Report SHOULD be
 - Read many papers
 - Examine and understand the papers
 - Process or digest the ideas of the papers
 - Organize and structure the papers
 - Reproduce or comment the main ideas of the topic with your own words
 - In order to produce a Technical term paper

Writing Essays - Summary

- Read / define the questions carefully
- Brainstorm
- Check if the topic sentence will support the thesis statement
- Check if all supporting ideas relate to the topic
- Add more details if necessary
- Put ideas in a logical order
- Write the introduction
- Write the body
- Write the conclusion
- Read over the essay

Brain Storming

- ◆ 5 x W and How
 - Who, What, Where, When, Why, How
- Write down any idea that comes into your head.
- Group the related ideas together.
- Write how these idea are related.
- Make a paragraph by each group
 - Topic sentence
 - Outline
 - Details

Reading Papers

- Before:
 - Note: Author, Title, Source (bibtex)
 - Date
 - My current knowledge
 - Ask questions to be answered by the paper
- During:
 - Note important points by the author
 - Striking
- After:
 - What are the answers to the stated questions?
 - Concluding remarks

Circle and Fix the Topic I

- Note
 - Inspirations
 - Ideas
 - Questions
 - Weak Thoughts
- Review all of them!

Circle and Fix the Topic II

- What is the problem?
- How can I solve it?
- What is already done?
- Which ideas do I have?
- How to value my work with respect to other research?

Writing Essays I

- Introductory paragraph
- Body is made up of paragraphs that support the introduction
- Conclusion restates the topic

Introduction

- Introduce the topic in general
- Narrow the topic down to focus more on the questions
- Restate the question in your own words an in statement form
- Conclude with the thesis statement and indicate the controlling idea
- --> State the problem & the controlling idea

Writing Essays II

Body

- Developmental paragraph should have a topic sentence that supports the controlling idea mentioned in the thesis statement
- Ideas in each paragraph should support their topic sentence
- --> Discuss the problem

Conclusion

- Restate the thesis statement
- Restate the topic sentence from the developmental paragraph
- State your opinion or preference, make a prediction, or give a solution
- Conclude with a statement that sums up the essay

Writing Paragraphs I

Topic sentence

- States the topic and a controlling idea concerning the topic
- Tells the person what the paragraph is about
- All the ideas stated in the rest of the paragraph should refer to the given topic and the controlling ideas

Phrases to express the controlling idea

- The reason for...
- The changes to...
- The precautions for...
- The problem...
- The causes of... (the effect of...)
- The steps for... (the procedure for...)
- The advantages of... (the disadvantages of...)
- The ways to... (the methods of...)
- The different sections (parts, kinds, types) of...
- The characteristics (traits, qualities) of ...

Writing Paragraphs II

Details

- Fully developed paragraphs are made by additional details like:
 - Facts, examples, personal experiences, description
- Rewrite "weak" paragraphs by answering the questions and
- using those answers within the paragraph

Analyzing Essays I

- Is there an introductory paragraph?
- Does the introductory paragraph restate the questions?
- Does the introductory paragraph have a thesis statement (controlling idea)?
- Does each paragraph have a clear topic sentence?
- Does the topic sentence of the developmental paragraphs support the thesis statement?
- Do the ideas in each developmental paragraph support the topic sentence of the paragraph?
- Are the details (examples, facts, descriptions, personal experiences) clear?

Analyzing Essays II

- Is there a concluding paragraph?
- Does the concluding paragraph give (A) an opinion, preference, prediction or solution and (B) reasons?
- Does the essay end with a concluding statement?
- Does the essay answers all parts of the question?
- Have the grammar and spelling been corrected?
- See also REVIEW PAPERS!

Review Papers / Essays

- Where is the paper published
- Is it a proper work (are there typos)?
- Are there correct citations?
- Is the common style considered?
- Is the used "language" understandable?
- Is the outline clear?
- Which references are mentioned?
- Which references are missing?
- Are there comparable works considered?
- Who is the author?
- What is the (working) background?
- Who are the persons mentioned in the acknowledgment?
